JAN SHIPPS

*THE LEGAL, HISTORICAL,
AND THEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND
SURROUNDING THE UNIVERSALIZATION
OF THE MORMON MESSAGE IN 1978*

Jan Shipps is Professor Emerita of History and Religious Studies at Indiana University-Purdue University, Indianapolis. She currently holds an Andrew W. Mellon Emeritus Faculty Fellowship that is allowing her to write a book on Mormonism since World War II. Although she has never been a Mormon, Shipps is a recognized authority on the Latter-day Saints. In addition to a host of articles and reviews for both popular and scholarly periodicals, she is the author of *Mormonism: the Story of a New Religious Tradition*; *Sojourner in the Promised Land: Forty Years Among the Mormons*; and *Religion in the Mountain West*.

DR. ZUHDI JASSER

M. Zuhdi Jasser, M.D. is the Founder and President of the American Islamic Forum for Democracy (AIFD). Dr. Jasser founded AIFD in the wake of the 9/11 attacks on the United States as an effort to provide an American Muslim voice advocating for the preservation of the founding principles of the United States Constitution, liberty and freedom, and the separation of mosque and state. Dr. Jasser regularly briefs members of the House and Senate congressional anti-terror caucuses and was one of four panelists invited to testify before the United States House of Representatives Committee on Homeland Security on "The Extent of Radicalization in the American Muslim Community and that Community's Response."

LARRY ECHO HAWK

Larry Echo Hawk, a former Idaho Attorney General and state legislator, was confirmed Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs on May 20, 2009. President Obama nominated him for the position on April 20, 2009. A member of the Pawnee Nation, Echo Hawk was elected Attorney General of Idaho in 1990, the first American Indian in U.S. history elected as a state attorney general. A former U. S. Marine, Echo Hawk has also served as a professor of law at Brigham Young University's J. Reuben Clark Law School, teaching federal Indian law, criminal law, criminal procedure, evidence and criminal trial practice, and has published several scholarly papers.
